ST TERESA'S SENIOR AND PREP RECEIVE EXCELLENT ISI INSPECTION REPORTS

St Teresa's Prep and Senior Schools were visited by the Independent Schools' Inspectorate (ISI) in May 2023. The inspectors observed lessons and extra-curricular activities, scrutinised books, interviewed staff, met with a wide selection of girls from across all the age ranges and analysed responses from the staff, pupil and parent questionnaires.

The inspectors were extremely impressed by the sense of community they experienced during their visit and felt that the St Teresa's ethos and values underpinned all areas of school life.

RECORD NUMBERS

St Teresa's started the new academic year with numbers at an all time high.

Demand for 2024 is high.

EXAM RESULTS

Despite the media's best efforts to catastrophise in the preceding days, I am delighted to report that university entrance was remarkably plain sailing. With grades becoming aligned with those of 2019, there was an inevitable dip in the number of the very highest grades awarded but given their ambition, commitment, focus, determination and resilience – qualities that are the hallmark of this year group – it is no surprise that 96% have secured their first-choice university place.

However, our girls certainly impressed, with 72% of all grades awarded being A*-B, and almost half of the cohort gained entrance to a Russell Group university.

There were some notably outstanding performances. Having achieved A*AAA, **Kirsten** L is heading to Sheffield to read Medicine, while **Olivia M's** A*A*A has secured her

place to undertake Business Management with Marketing at Bath. Jess H is embarking on Classical Civilisation at Nottingham having achieved A*A*A and Pippa M's clutch of A*AAA has confirmed her place to read Modern Languages and Linguistics at Newcastle. Sophia C's string of three straight As is her passport to Manchester where she will study Psychology.



GCSE Results

We are delighted to report our GCSE results for 2023. The Year 11s defied the media doom-mongers who prophesied that GCSE results would be very depressed, and have achieved an outstanding set of results. The girls have excelled, with almost 50% of grades awarded being 9–7. 75% of grades awarded are 9-6, which represents a significant increase from 2019. This is a huge accomplishment and we applaud all the girls for their hard work and determination.

We could not be prouder of you all.

AN EXTRACT FROM DR McSHANE'S SPEECH

The most important people who are leaving today are our Year 13s. Every so often there is a cohort that one would describe as 'memorably good'. That is Year 13. Now, I know what you're thinking: you said that last year; and you'd be correct. However, for sheer camaraderie, joy, conviviality and an unerring ability to Get Stuff Done, you would be hard pressed to find a better year group. Although small in number, they have more than held their own. Their leadership abilities, to a man, are second to none; many of them had to double up on prefect roles, leading huge areas of responsibility with style and good cheer. I thank each and every one of you for the contribution you have made to student leadership, to the academic and pastoral elements of the school, to the Prep School, to our Values, to every year group, to pupil wellbeing, Student Council in every capacity in which you have served, or simply by being role models, your efforts are known and appreciated. You have all made an indelible mark on St T's, and we will miss you hugely.

Things won't always go your way. Things will, in fact often go so wrong that you will feel like you're about to be stranded on the moon. On those occasions, it would be much better, surely, not to have gone to the moon in the first place. That it is better to fail without trying than to try and fail. It would be better to have stayed in bed. That it is somehow better to give up, to be, as the parlance of the day has it, a victim.

To which I say: balderdash. So when things start to go wrong, buck up and jam a felt tip pen in the situation. And while you're at it, look up and realise that we are in an infinitely expanding universe. No one ever came back from space burdened by the weight of their own greatness. They come back, having gazed upon this fragile blue marble, spinning in black, empty vastness, and know exactly where they stand. They didn't go for personal glory; they went because they had purpose; they went because they wanted to achieve something remarkable for the ordinary, miraculous people that make up the human race.

And if you feel that the time isn't right, that you should wait for perfect conditions before you set out to improve your corner of the world, or that you'll start tomorrow because somehow by tomorrow, you'll have changed your entire personality and be ready to do good, I direct you to the words of C S Lewis, who gave a speech in the Church of St Mary in Oxford on the eve of the Second World War about there being no such thing as the right time; that glory and beauty have always existed alongside turbulence and strife. Don't wait for the perfect conditions before starting to live, because you won't live at all.

You have everything you need, because the values of this school, of Faith, Character, Community, Compassion and Intellect, I hope, have taught you to treat others with compassion, to have moral sensibilities, to discern between that which is important and that which is empty noise, to realise that you are part of something much bigger than yourself, to be grateful, to stick to your convictions, to cultivate your sense of humour, and above all, to have courage. Arm yourself with a felt tip pen, because to get on in life, your response should always be: never say die.

This year's event began, as ever, with a traditional Latin grace read by the Classics department. WORLD SCHOLAR'S CUP

The World Scholar's Cup programme is a celebration of learning. Students study an interesting and contemporary curriculum. They then compete in teams of 3 against other schools in 4 different events – team debate, collaborative writing, scholars' challenge and scholars' bowl. We entered 5 teams from St Teresa's and Cranmore from Years 7–9 for the competition.

We hosted 10 schools from across the home counties and even an international school from Geneva, Switzerland.

All our teams qualified for the global round. The Year 9 team of **Isabel** C, Katy H and Daisy S came 2nd overall in the junior division. **Isabel** was the top scorer in the junior division team debate event and her skills were displayed during the showcase debate.















WORLD SCHOLAR'S CUP GLOBAL ROUND

After a successful regional round hosted by St Teresa's in March, six students from the Effingham Schools Trust took part in the global round of the World Scholar's Cup competition held at University College London 26–30 July 2023. We entered one team of Year 7 students from St Teresa's and a mixed team of Year 8 students from Cranmore and St Teresa's. The students travelled up to University College London each day and competed in four events - team debate, collaborative writing, scholars' challenge and scholars' bowl. The event included an opening ceremony at Bloomsbury Theatre, a scavenger hunt around Regents Park, a cultural fair held at the British Medical Association's headquarters as well as a ball at the London School of Economics student union. The round culminated in a closing ceremony held at the Light Auditorium. All our students enjoyed success and received medals for their achievements and both teams qualified for the Tournament of Champions to be held at Yale University in November. The programme has now been running at St Teresa's for 3 years and we hope to be able to offer our students the opportunity to compete in all three rounds in 2024.



PSHCE CONSENT LESSON

Year 8s and 9s from both St Teresa's and Cranmore had joint lessons on consent. They developed their

knowledge following on from the Schools Consent Project workshops. They learnt about the law of consent and discussed key terminology. Working in groups, they gave advice to characters in real life scenarios.



THIS YEAR IN **CLASSICS**

Our Year of Intellect has suited the Classics department very nicely indeed. In fact, it is probably our favourite value of the lot. We got off to a promising start in September with a well attended Enrichment Society talk on Homer's Iliad and Odyssey, outlining the plot and themes of these foundational epics of European literature. Our new PGCE trainee, Mr. Quar (who will be returning to join us full-time in September) followed this up with a fascinating talk in November on Linear B script - the earliest form of written Greek ever discovered. Equipped with clay and stylus, the girls even got to make their own tablets to take home, covered with various curses, palace inventories and love poems. The Autumn Term was rounded off with our customary Latin Christmas carols in the chapel, where much enthusiasm was shown for both Medieval originals and modern carols translated into Latin.

The Spring Term saw Yrs 12 and 13 venturing first to the British Museum and then to a Classics conference on Plato's Symposium, chaired by **Professor Edith Hall** of the University of Durham. Year 7 embarked on a Pompeii Tourist Guide project and Year 8 researched Boudicca and how the Romans responded to her revolt. Summer half term saw the long-awaited, post-Covid return of the Rome and Pompeii trip, which proved just as successful as any we did in the past. 25 girls from Years 8 and 9 saw sights ranging from the Colosseum and the Roman Forum to the cellars of Herculaneum and the house of Lucius Caecilius lucundus. I doubt any of us will be forgetting the balmy evenings in Sorrento or the view from Mount Vesuvius in a hurry.

As the year drew to a close and our exam cohorts prepared for their final exams, a lighter mood settled in Classics. Some of the girls dressed in togas and sandals for the Sixth-Form end of year party (Jess Hill's Julius Caesar was a big hit, though many commented she looked more like the Greek poet Sappho without Caesar's distinctive wrinkles and receding hairline). Dr. Poffley even put in a turn during Values Week's busking event, singing Barbie Girl by Aqua translated into Classical Latin. Rounding everything off, final-week fun for Year 10 involved playing Latin Scrabble, which was likewise a big hit.

Quite the itinerary, and difficult to know how we'll top that next year. Perhaps a libation to Jupiter is in order, given that next year's value is Faith...













FLOREAT FESTIVAL

As part of the year of Intellect, Year 7 have worked towards their Floreat Projects from October until late June. Each pupil was challenged to create a project about something that interested them. Floreat means "To FLOURISH" evoking the idea that the girls were growing their passion by taking part in this journey of intellectual discovery. The finished projects were displayed to an audience consisting of Year 6 pupils and parents. It was wonderful to see the sheer variety of the projects, mirroring the unique qualities and personalities of all our girls. The smorgasbord of topics included, but was not limited to, reptiles, fashion, dogs, snakes, Hong Kong, photography, Jamaica, sport, stationery and Harry Potter. Every pupil in Year 7 should feel very proud of their accomplishment!

















YOUNG ENTREPRENEUR

Darcey B took part in the Young Entrepreneurs Business Fair in Guildford on Saturday 15th April. She



was up against 44 other young entrepreneurs who were all showcasing their businesses. She was chosen by the BBC to be interviewed live on radio minutes before the fair started. Four prizes were up for grabs and after being interviewed by two separate teams of judges she scooped the top prize of "Judges Choice." The feedback included, "amazing products, incredible stand, prices are clear and Company branding superb." Well done Darcey. She later sold some of her pottery at Kingfest on Friday 5th May.


































HISTORY TALK

Year 7 had a guest speaker from Windsor Castle, the focus of the talk was 'What happened after 1066'. They discovered more about the aftermath of the Battle of Hastings, particularly the introduction of the Feudal System by William the Conqueror – some of the girls even got to dress up as the King, Nobles, Knights and Peasants! Building on their knowledge of the Medieval period, the speaker also explained how Windsor Castle developed from a traditional Motte and Bailey Castle to a stone fortress that is very difficult to attack. 



ROME AND POMPEII

The trip began at a quite frankly uncivilised hour. I doubt any of us would have got up at 1.45am for much else. But despite all that, and Mrs Randall's unfortunate incident shutting her fingers in a window up in boarding, we were off to a brisk start. The next few hours on coaches and trains flew by, until we found ourselves early in the morning, walking through the deserted streets of Rome on our way to our first big destination – the Colosseum. The girls were genuinely impressed by the scale and grandeur of the building, and with crowds of tourists milling round it was easy to imagine ourselves back in the First Century as the trumpets sounded and the gladiatorial games began.

On Saturday we spent our time in the Vatican Museum and St. Peter's Basilica, marvelling at the treasures the Catholic Church has acquired over the centuries. We passed by the Tomb of Scipio Barbatus the Laocoon statue, Nero's Porphyry bath and hundreds more pieces in awe, before the tapestry and geographical mural galleries led us to the Sistine Chapel. Leaving before our necks were too tired from all that looking up, we checked out the inside of St. Peter's, to the accompaniment of a sextet of nuns singing Ave Maria over the speaker system. Stopping briefly to see the chapel to St. Therese in the Church of St. Mary of the Angels and Martyrs (or, the Baths of Diocletian as we classicists tend to know it), we all piled on to the coach once more to head for the Bay of Naples.

Sunday was our day to climb up Vesuvius and take in the views, while Monday saw us visit Pompeii and Herculaneum to get as close as we could to life in a Roman town. It was very interesting, seeing how the grandiose architecture of Rome itself was recreated on a much more human scale here, and everyone had a soft spot for the House of Caecilius lucundus, star of our much beloved Cambridge Latin Course (sadly his wife Metella was not in residence in the atrium, as the course had promised us she would be).

We had a wonderful time, if an exhausting one (Mrs. Randall's fitbit told us we walked about 13km most days), and thanks to the tireless work put in by Mr. Melvin on social media a record of that joy remains for all who went and those who didn't. Hopefully his welter of bad puns will stand the test of time as well as the ruins of Pompeii have, though I very much doubt it.




BRIGHTON ART TRIP


SIXTH FORM ST IVES TRIP



MATHS MASTERCLASS

During this academic year, the Year 12 Maths A Level students have worked alongside the Royal Institute to deliver a series of masterclasses to Year 5 pupils from schools across Surrey including students from St Teresa's, Cranmore, St. Martin's, and Eastwick.

Masterclasses are a series of workshops where students can explore mathematics and computer science outside the confines of the classroom, through hands-on extra-curricular workshops. In collaboration with the Royal Institute, St Teresa's has provided a handful of gifted mathematicians in local primary schools an opportunity to expand their current level of understanding into topics beyond their curriculum.

The Year 12 students were lucky to have Rachel Doris from the Royal Institute in to show them how to run the classes. The first session was led by Dr Jenny Sharp from Plymouth University, where she discussed counting in base 8 instead of base 10. This allowed the pupils to discover a new form of counting.

The following session was run by Sophie R, Ariella W and Emily E, where they delivered a session on fractions using mixtures of coloured water to demonstrate the varying shades of purple.

The third session was run by Louise B and Kirsten S on probability, a relatively new concept which the pupils highly enjoyed. They made their own dice and conducted a range of probability experiments to understand relative frequency.

The penultimate masterclass was run by Grace J, Coco Z and Amily Z, who led the students through a series of cipher and code breaking tasks, with a prize at the end.

The final masterclass was led by Alison Eves from the Royal Institute which was based on Maths in Space. The pupils used scaled measurements to get a glimpse into just how big our solar system is.

Overall, this was a highly rewarding experience for both Sixth Formers and Year 5 budding mathematicians, as both groups have gained many valuable new skills. In particular, the Year 12 mathematicians led a series of outstanding masterclasses and should be congratulated on running such a highly successful programme.


OXBRIDGE TRIP

On 9th March the Oxbridge trip took place. The long journey was well worth it with the stunning Oxford town hall. Here, the lectures were taking place. The first of which was held by Julie Arliss, a lecturer at Kings College who works closely with Oxford and Exeter University. Having spoken to the rest of the girls, her lecture on Justice, truth and beauty was particularly well received. She addressed theories of beauty, justice and truth, and used both ancient and contemporary examples to explore the complexity of our judgements and the difficulties of living in a society where beauty has become almost an ethical ideal. With an enthusiastic round of applause she gave a very useful and relevant lecture on the Oxbridge interviews, in which the key notes were: read, read and read a bit more and how showing how you think is key among other things.

A quick trip to the café down the road and then the next lecture held by **Dr Christopher O'Neill** begun. Dr O'Neill is a psychologist who leads the MYRIAD research project at Oxford University. His talk was on the psychology of outstanding achievement. He discussed the myths and truths surrounding the secrets behind success. His advice encouraged us to move past our fixed mind-sets and to push onto a path of success, determination and hard work. After this, both Julie Arliss and Dr O'Neill opened the hall to a debate with the statement: 'This house believes that it isn't OK to make comments about other people's bodies'. Having been presented with two contrasting arguments the students were given the opportunity to take the microphone and offer their thoughts and opinions.

There was a vast number who took part, with a massively ranging set of opinions. After the debate was concluded Julie Arliss proposed the question to the hall for a final vote. Ultimately the large majority voted against the statement, and thus, the consensus was that commenting on people's bodies is ok but with the addition from the crowd that the comments must be handled with care and good intentions.

After this, they returned to the cafés for lunch before the final part of the day: **Dr Mark Lewney** who described himself as a cross between Hendrix and Einstein. In the 70cm the team of Jess R, Rosie C and Abbie K took a great win, with Rosie finishing 3rd and Jess 9th, qualifying the team for the Grassroots Champs at Hickstead in August!



NSFA **FELBRIDGE**

On Sunday 11th June we had lots of riders taking part in the NSEA show jumping and Combined Training show at Felbridge with some brilliant results.

In the Grassroots competition, **Florence B** jumped two super rounds in the 50cm & 60cm for a beautiful double clear in the 60cm and 10th place.

In the 70cm **Emily R** was taking part in her first competition for STE and jumped a brilliant double clear for 6th place!

In the 75cm, Rosie C competed as an individual for a great clear and 12th place in a big class.

In the 85cm we had a team of **Chloe B, Lilly S** and **Rosie C** who finished 7th. Chloe B was 6th individually and Lilly S was 9th.

In the 95cm **Chloe B** rode a super round for individual 3rd and qualification for the NSEA Champs at Addington in September whilst **Lilly S** had 4 faults but still finished in the top half.

Lilly S was also competing in the Combined Training and had a brilliant day, with a 1st and a 3rd in the 80-85cm class with two 70%+ scores and clear jumping rounds. She also had a 3rd in the 90–95cm class with another +70% dressage score and an unlucky 4 penalties in the jumping.



HURST SCHOOL SHOW JUMPING CHAMPIONSHIPS

On Friday 30th June, we had a really exciting day as 9 NSEA riders were lucky enough to head to The All England Jumping Course, Hickstead for the prestigious Hurst School Show Jumping Championships.

The day started very early for our Juniors with a 7.30am start in the Preliminary round. Great rounds from **Amber B** & **Antonia S** for four faults each. **Claudia B** jumped a confident round for eight faults. Last to go for the team was **Jess R** who jumped a brilliant clear round which gave her qualification for the International Arena later that afternoon. **Lottie B** was jumping as an Individual on her lovely new horse and after a miscommunication at the first fence then jumped a fab clear! Unfortunately, the team missed out on qualification for the main arena by I place but still finished in the top 50%!

The Senior team (U18s) were by far the youngest and on the smallest ponies, with three of our four riders still eligible for the Junior section but wanting to jump the bigger height. This didn't put them off, with some incredibly mature riding way beyond their years. Inde W and Izzy L both jumped great rounds with just a couple of small mistakes. Pernille A showed experience beyond her years and retired before the last line when her pony was full of confidence. Chloe B jumped the most beautiful round other than a miscommunication at one fence for 4 faults. So, no qualification for any of the senior team this year but they will have learnt so much and excitingly it was just their first try!

In the International Arena, Jess R was one of 6 clear rounds in the Individual section out of 30 in the first round of jumping. An unfortunate 4 faults in the jump off left her just out of the placings but it was a fantastic performance from Jess and Mandy who are still a very new combination – I think we will be seeing lots of great results from them in the future!

Very proud of how well they all rode - well done everyone!

Friday — They had a fantastic time dancing their hearts out at our Silent Disco on Friday! They jammed out to various hits such as YMCA and The Macarena!


















































BSA ORCHARD PLANTING

We finished the day by taking part in our very own Greek Olympic Games. What a fun and exciting day.










STONE AGE DAY
